The Department of Public Instruction administers the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) in Wisconsin.

The CACFP is a Federal program that helps provide nutritious meals and snacks to children and adults receiving day care. To accomplish this goal, USDA has established standards for the types and amounts of food to be served. Eligible facilities that meet these standards are reimbursed for the meals served to enrolled participants. Reimbursement is paid for up to two meals and one snack **or** one meal and two snacks for each participant each day. Through the CACFP, participants' nutritional needs are supported on a daily basis. The program plays a vital role in improving the quality of day care and making it more affordable for many low-income families.

In addition to day care, the CACFP helps make after school programs more appealing to at-risk youth. By offering nutritious snacks in programs serving low-income areas, agencies can increase their participation and know that youth are having a healthy snack.

Homeless children and children from temporarily displaced families can also receive up to three meals each day thorough shelters that participate in the program.

CACFP Facilities

Many different facilities operate the CACFP, all sharing the common goal of bringing nutritious meals and snacks to enrolled participants.

Child Care Centers – Licensed or approved public, private nonprofit (Federal tax-exempt) child care centers, outside of school hour centers, Head Start programs, and some for-profit centers.

Day Care Homes – Small groups of children receive nonresidential day care in licensed or certified private homes. The day care home must participate through an approved sponsoring organization. (See the attached list of currently approved sponsoring organizations.)

After School Programs – Licensed or approved public, private nonprofit (Federal tax-exempt), and some for-profit centers and sites in low-income areas provide free snacks and meals to school-age children and youth.

Emergency Shelters —Licensed or approved public or private nonprofit (Federal tax-exempt), organizations and their sites provide residential and food services to homeless children and their parents or guardians.

Adult Day Care Centers —Licensed public, private nonprofit (Federal tax-exempt) and some for-profit adult day care facilities provide structured, comprehensive services to functionally impaired nonresident adults and persons 60 years and older.

Eligible Participants

- Children age 12 and under,
- Migrant children age 15 and younger,
- Functionally impaired, non-institutionalized adults or adults 60 years and older enrolled in an adult day care center,
- Youths through age 18 enrolled in after school programs in needy areas, and
- Homeless children through age 18.
